Emotional Stability: More stable = more calm in exciting events (i.e., fire alarms)

Indoor Activity: More active = more space and more patience Outdoor Activity: More active = more exercise needed

Visiting Strangers: Probable reaction breed will have to strangers who drop by.

Sociability with Groups: How sociable/tolerant a breed is with large groups of people.

Territoriality: This has to do with the likelihood that a dog will stake out and protect a sizeable territory.

Dominance: How a breed is likely to act towards people or other dogs.
