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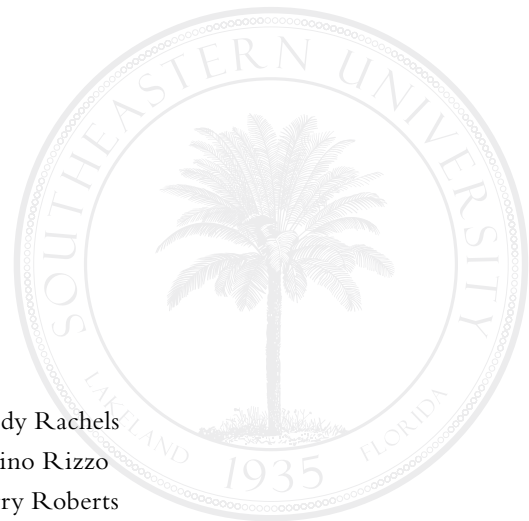
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Mission Statement

History of Southeastern University

Southeastern University was founded in 1935 by Alabama District Superintendent J.C. Thames and other Southeastern District leaders. Originally named the Alabama Shield of Faith Institute, it was renamed the South-Eastern Bible Institute (SEBI) in 1936. Guy Shields was the first president.

Originally located in a former high school building in New Brockton, Alabama, the school opened its doors to students on November 4, 1935, under the direction of four faculty members. Two years later, on May 22, 1937, the first graduation exercises were held. Seventeen students received diplomas for the two-year academic program.

SEBI continued classes in New Brockton until 1940 when a decision was made to consolidate the school with Beulah Heights Bible Institute in Atlanta, Georgia. The school was known from 1940 to 1942 as the Beulah Heights-South-Eastern Bible Institute. In the fall of 1942, Rev. Ralph Byrd allowed the school to relocate to his congregation at 301-7 Capital Ave., SW in Atlanta, where it then was once again named the South-Eastern Bible Institute.

In 1946, the board of directors voted to secure a permanent location for the full development of the school. A new campus location was purchased later that year in Lakeland, Florida. The Atlanta campus was sold, and development of the new site began. From 1946 to 1952, SEBI was located at the Lodwick School of Aeronautics in Lakeland. In 1952, the school moved to its present location at Longfellow Blvd.





Student body growth continued at the new central Florida campus along with the academic programs. SEBI became South-Eastern Bible College in 1956 when four-year Bachelor of Arts degree programs began. After adding education degrees, the college's board of directors changed the school name to Southeastern College of the Assemblies of God in 1977.

In 1986, Southeastern was granted regional accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. This accreditation was reaffirmed in 1991, 2001 and 2011.

In 2005, Southeastern College officially became Southeastern University, began offering its first master's degree programs and formed the Colleges of Arts & Sciences, Business, Christian Ministries & Religion, and Education. Since then, the university has also formed the Colleges of Behavioral & Social Sciences and Natural & Health Sciences and, in 2014, began offering doctoral programs. We now offer an EdD and DMin.

What began in 1935 as a Bible-training school is now the largest Assemblies of God educational institution in America, producing future Christian leaders in the fields of church ministries, education, medicine, law, business, communication, psychology, social work, literature and music.

Points of Excellence

Campus Growth

This fall SEU completed the brand new Buena-Vida Complex. This 125,000 square-foot live/learn facility contains student resident halls, classrooms, faculty offices, a tutoring center, music performance and education spaces, and a food court consisting of Einstein Bros. Bagels, Papa John's Pizza, and Backyard Burgers.

Campus expansion will continue with the groundbreaking of a new administration building in Spring 2017. This building will be adjacent to the Fire Football Stadium and will house executive offices, conference rooms, administrative offices, and a multipurpose hospitality space overlooking the stadium with full kitchen service.

Our School of Extended Education has experienced significant growth with over 1,500 students enrolled in online, evening, and extension site programs at over 45 locations across the U.S.

Enrollment Growth

Southeastern continued to grow this year and was again recognized by the Chronicle of Higher Education as one of the nation's fastest-growing private, baccalaureate institutions. In just the last 10 years, enrollment has increased by 95%.

New Programs

The new academic year saw the launch of a number of new academic programs, including a bachelor's degree in Digital Media & Design and Business Analysis, a master's degree in International Community Development, and our second doctoral degree, the Doctor of Ministry.



Alumni Relations

A few highlights from alumni this past year:

Michael Hughes ('16) was the first student from Southeastern to be published in a peer-reviewed journal along with his co-author Jessica Logue ('15). He has published three books on wildlife in Arizona, Brazil, and Florida while a student at SEU.

Leaha (Anderson) Shaikh ('00) and her husband serve with Campus Crusade for Christ (Cru) and Athletes in Action. They served as Olympic chaplains at three Olympic events ministering to athletes. Leaha is a contributing author for the *NIV Bible for Women: Fresh Insights for Thriving in Today's World*, and co-authored a memoir, *Open Doors*, with her husband. Together they planted a church in St. Petersburg, Florida.

Kirsti Mutz ('15) launched a nonprofit, People Like Us, in Lakeland, Florida, for the purpose of shining light on individuals with disabilities. Her documentary film, *People Like Us*, features the story of six people with different disabilities and their methods of dealing with society.

Dr. Tonya Hawthorne, D.O. ('83) acted on God's calling on her life and founded New Frontiers Health Force (NFHF), a non-profit organization with a vision of reaching nations through the development of international health centers,

medical outreaches and community education programs. Dr. Hawthorne was named the Humanitarian of the Year by President George W. Bush. She began a long-term project in Ngoswani in Kenya: the Ngoswani Community Health Center (NCHC).

Retiree Chaplain (COL) Richard Quinn ('78), who retired in October of 2015, has his sights set on Washington and the launching the first ever chaplaincy program in the U.S. State Department (pending acceptance, approval and funding). During his career in chaplaincy, Richard had the opportunity to minister across the globe, citing the initial years of his career, while awaiting entrance to active duty, as being some of the most critical. He was deployed to Central America during the Iran-Contra scandal and in the Middle East during Operation Desert Storm. He had the opportunity during his final years in the Army to help update the ecclesiastical supply system for chaplains through the Defense Logistics Agency, a system he helped create in the late 1990s. He aims to create a corps of 15 chaplains in the State Department. He also created a firm called Chaplaincy Solutions Research and Consulting.

Athletic News

The Southeastern University athletic programs put together another record-breaking school year, sending five teams and eight individuals to NAIA National Championships.

In just the fourth year of softball, the Fire won their second consecutive Sun Conference regular season championship, and made a second straight trip to the NAIA National Tournament Opening Round. Southeastern went on to win the opening round bracket, and advanced to the NAIA World Series for the first time in program history. During the time in Iowa, the Fire upset the two-time defending national champions, and finished third.

Women's basketball won the Sun Conference regular season and tournament championships for the first time in program history, and appeared in the NAIA National Tournament for a second straight season.

Men's soccer enjoyed a historic season, winning The Sun Conference regular season and tournament championships for the first time in program history, and won their first game in the NAIA National Tournament, to advance to the Round of 16.

Volleyball shocked the field when they won The Sun Conference Tournament for the first time in program history, entering as the No. 3 seed and upsetting second place and the regular season champion to secure a spot in the NAIA National Tournament for the first time.

Sixty-three Fire student-athletes were selected to the Academic All-Sun Conference teams. Southeastern also had 22 First Team All-Sun Conference honorees, saw eight teams ranked in the NAIA top 25, and won a total of seven Sun Conference regular season and tournament championships.

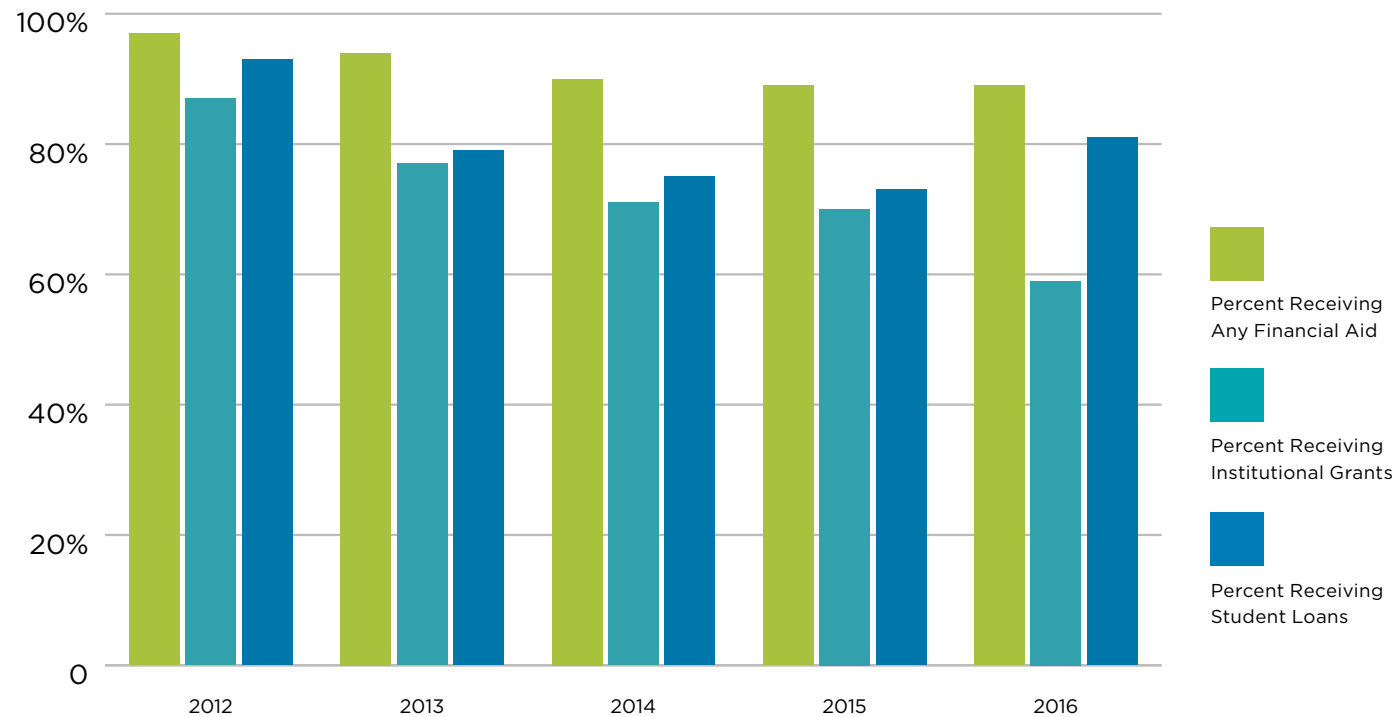
